




PARTICIPATION IN LABOR FORCE: PUERTO RICO 2000




MEDIAN AGE BY ETHNIC GROUP: PUERTO RICO 2000




MEDIAN EDUCATION BY ETHNIC GROUP **PUERTO RICO 2000**




SEX RATIO BY ETNIC GROUP: PUERTO RICO 2000




MEDIAN INCOME BY ETHNIC GROUP: PUERTO RICO 2000





WORKED HOURS BY ETHNIC GROUP: PUERTO RICO 2000




MARITAL STATUS BY ETHNIC GROUP PUERTO RICOO 2000












OCCUPATION BY ETHNIC GROUP: PUERTO RICO 2000










■ White Collar ■ Services ■ Agricultural ■ Blue Collar








MEDIAN EDUCATION BY ETHNIC GROUP: PUERTO RICO 2000




SEX RATIO BY ETNIC GROUP: PUERTO RICO 2000
